Why Energy Matters in Nelson, BC





Environment

- Energy use = emissions. Many common energy sources—like natural gas, oil, and gasoline—release greenhouse gases when burned.
- In our region, energy use drives climate change. In BC, heating buildings and water accounts for a large portion of carbon emissions. In Nelson, that often means electric baseboard heat, natural gas, or oil heating.
- Climate change hits close to home. From smoky skies and extreme wildfire
 seasons to floods and food insecurity, we're seeing the local effects right here
 in the Kootenays. These impacts threaten ecosystems, tourism, farming, and
 public health.



Cost Savings

- Energy is expensive. For small businesses, costs for lighting, heating, cooling, and equipment can quietly eat into margins.
- Small changes = real savings. Turning off unused appliances, managing thermostats, and switching to efficient lighting or equipment can reduce energy bills—without compromising comfort or service.



Reliability & Resilience

- Peak energy demand puts stress on the grid. In cold snaps and heat waves, overuse can increase risk of power outages and lead to peak demand charges.
